Rue the Day

Age Suitability: 12-14 years / Year 8-10

Strand: Drugs and Substances
Subject: Cannabis – Possession and Supply

Schools have a central role to play in reducing risk by providing educational inputs that raise awareness about the harms and consequences of illegal drugs. By exploring the dangers of drugs and substances, officers can help learners to develop the skills to identify potential risks and consequences, stay safe and seek help if needed.

Ensure that the lesson is appropriate for the needs of learners in terms of their age, maturity, language/images used, and understanding required. Furthermore, this lesson is only to be delivered if a teacher is always present in the classroom.

School Police Officers should ensure that they have discussed the content of the lesson with the class teacher and be mindful of any children who might be vulnerable to the content of the lesson.
